

This year's Summer Reading Program was a tremendous joy for the library staff. We enjoyed exploring the arts with all of you & we are thankful for the many businesses & organizations who partnered with us & who participated in our annual community scavenger hunt. We especially enjoyed the connections we made with all of you & the stories of creativity, library joy, & learning that we got to hear about from you.

October is Family History month. If you have not had the chance to drop in & visit our History Center, please consider doing so. Library staff members are happy to give tours of the room at any time & show you the resources we have for genealogy & local history research. Marshall District Library's grant-funded Newspaper Archive is available to all area residents at home & currently includes all microfilmed Marshall newspapers from 1838 to 2024. This last year, thanks to the support of the Withee-Bliss fund, we have also been able to add Albion newspapers from 1849 to 2011 to this resource, as well as Tekonsha newspapers from 1967 to 2019. If you would like personalized assistance with research, we hold History Center Hours twice each week. You can also make an individual appointment with one of our librarians.

One of the events we are most excited about this fall is "If These Stones Could Talk," which is the return of the much-loved living history portrayal at historic Oakridge Cemetery. In 2003, an amazing group of volunteers in Marshall created a "Living History" steering committee, a partnership of the Marshall Historical Society & the Marshall Civic Players. For a decade, more than a hundred local volunteers gave of their time: conducting research, writing scripts, acting as tour guides, portraying characters, & working behind the scenes. They made this event, which raised funds for cemetery preservation & other historic preservation work, a reality.

In 2019, Georgia Marsh contacted us about the possibility of reviving "If These Stones Could Talk" & the library was fortunate enough to work with a steering committee of volunteers from Marshall Historical Society, Great Escape Stage Company, Marshall Chamber, & City of Marshall to form a "Living History" non-profit & hold an event. That event was very successful & showed how much interest there still was in the community, but we were unable to continue in 2020. In 2023, it was decided by the committee that all funds raised from this project would be donated to the Marshall Community Foundation Cemetery fund. It was also decided that the library would serve as an archive for materials & take the lead on bringing a new, free version of "If These Stones Could Talk" to our community. We are honored to continue this work & we are delighted to continue working with many organizations & volunteers to bring Marshall history to life.
